5. QUESTION TIME

The Mayor read the following statement:

"We will now move onto question time, which will go for 30 minutes.

Before we start however I'd like to apologise to anyone who felt like they didn't get a full opportunity to ask their questions at last month's meeting. I assure you my intention was to make sure everyone got a go, given we had several people who wanted to ask questions, however, I realise that it didn't quite work as well as it should have. So to make it really clear for everyone, I'll now outline how question time runs to ensure that everyone gets the chance to ask their questions, but also that we stick to the question time guidelines to be fair to everyone who would like to ask a question. If we have meetings where a number of people would like to ask questions, it may be that we need to allocate two questions per person until we get through the group, and then if time permits we can come back for a second round and anyone who would like to, can ask more questions.

Please note that it is not often possible for officers to provide a response at the meeting so I encourage you to make an appointment to meet with Councillors or Council officers should a more detailed response is needed than that which can be given here today."

Thank you. Now 30 minutes is allowed for question time. Please remember, you must ask a question. If you do not ask a question you will be asked to sit down and the next person will be invited to ask a question. This is not a forum for public debate or statements.

Questions received in writing prior to the meeting

James Judd - Colac

 In view of an answer on the pensioner rebate given prior to the State budget for 2015, that the rebate would be known when the State budget was brought down on 5 May 2015, plus the refusal to state what it would be at the Special Council meeting on 10 June 2015, can Council now confirm how much this will be for 2015-2016? The total granted for 2014-2015 was only \$208.

Response:

Advice was received from DHS on 11/06/2015 that pensioner rates concession for 2015-16 financial year will be \$213.00.

2. As we are almost half way through 2015, what happened to Council's 2050 Plan supposed to be released early in the new year so submissions could be made on it? People want to know what is proposed prior to it being adopted.

Response:

The Colac 2050 Project commenced in January of this year, with the appointment of a project manager. The project is currently in the Inception & Research Phase which will be completed by June 2016. This will be followed by the commencement of the community engagement process which will run from June to December 2016. It will include the development of a vision for the town and begin the development of the

new Growth Plan. The 2050 Growth Plan will be finalised by May 2017 in preparedness for formal adoption and an exhibition process. A key aspect of the Inception and Research phase occurring this year, is the development of an Economic Development and Land Use Strategy for Colac which looks at future land needs for retail and industrial development. Specific stakeholders will be engaged through the development of that strategy.

3. When will Council officers put at least as much effort and time into developing schemes Council can finance from within its own finances not waste ratepayers money and Council's time to push schemes that can only be seen through on receipt of much funds from other levels of government and or community works in kind?

Response:

As part of the development of the annual budget all projects and possible opportunities are considered.

Mr Judd has also made a statement about rebates for pensioners, as he has not asked a question, the statement will not be read out.

1. What is the area, in hectares, of the Wannon Water Catchment within the boundaries of the Colac Otway Shire?

Response:

The area of declared water catchment managed by Wannon Water, within the Colac Otway Shire, is approximately 66,081 hectares.

2. What are the number of dwellings within this area?

Response:

Whilst Council is unable to confirm the number of dwellings in the declared water catchment managed by Wannon Water, it is estimated there is approximately 250 dwellings within the settlements. This does not include dwellings in rural areas in between the settlements.

Cr Delahunty returned to the meeting at 4.12pm.

1. With respect to item OM152604-9 Contract 1508 – Engineering Consultancy Services, how big is the consultancy fee to have the consultants on standby?

Response:

The Acting General Manager for Infrastructure & Leisure Services advised that there is no fee for being on the panel of engineering consultants. Fees are only payable when the consultants have been engaged for a project.

Cr Delahunty returned to the meeting at 4.15pm.

Jayne Olds - Elliminyt

1. How does Council decide which sports facilities receive an upgrade?

Response:

The General Manager for Corporate Services advised that the allocation of funding for upgrades to sporting facilities was considered in line with the Council's capital works program, asset renewal priorities and grant opportunities in order to determine what works can be undertaken in a financial year.

2. How does Council determine which sporting venues are ear-marked for multi-use facilities?

Response:

The General Manager for Corporate Services advised that Council officers hold discussions with various committees and that it is Council's preferred option that sporting venues are multi-purpose wherever possible. Ms Olds was encouraged to discuss any specific requests with officers.

My questions relate to a request from the South Colac Football Netball club to install
netball posts on two of the Elliminyt tennis courts and the removal of tennis nets from
courts at Gellibrand, Irrewarra/Beeac, Alvie and Western Eagles reserves.

Response:

The General Manager for Corporate Services advised that he would take the question on notice.

Simon Arundell

1. Who amongst you have got the guts to argue for and get a zero increase in rates this year?

Response:

The Mayor advised that the budget was listed for discussion during today's meeting.

2. Does Council realise that they are handing over thousands of dollars hand over fist in replacing the organics bin when only 8% of bins are faulty? Why are they all being replaced at a cost of \$800,000?

Response:

The Acting General Manager Infrastructure and Leisure Services advised that the replacement of bins is done on a cycle basis. The question as to what had triggered the replacement of the organics bin was taken on notice.

3. Will you go back and look at the project to try and save \$200,000?

Response:

The CEO advised that the rollout of the new bins is almost complete and encouraged Mr Arundell to provide his questions prior to the meeting so that responses can be prepared. The CEO undertook to contact Mr Arundell to discuss his concerns.

Ray Cooper

Having declared a conflict of interest in this item, Cr Delahunty left the meeting at 4.22pm.

1. As the dwelling density calculations were introduced in 2009, and were not applied by Wannon Water until 2013, did Council in their discussions with Wannon Water during this 2 ½ years get an explanation from them on why they waited to early 2013 to apply the density levels?

Response:

The Acting General Manager for Community and Development Services advised that while the calculations for density levels had been around since 2009, the State Government revised the guidelines in late 2012 with increased emphasis for local government and water authorities to ensure that they were applied to new developments. This had been in response to strong concerns expressed by VCAT that Councils and water authorities prior to that time had not been applying them in the decision making process for new developments. So while the calculations have been around since 2009, they were strengthened in late 2012.

2. So did Wannon Water decide to implement the density guidelines in early 2013 as a mechanism to trigger the Shire to develop a Domestic Wastewater Management Plan?

Response:

The Acting General Manager for Community and Development Services advised that around the time Wannon Water began to more rigorously enforce the dwelling density guidelines, using the one dwelling per 40 hectare calculation, that it was being consistently applied throughout the industry by other water authorities and local governments. As stated previously, this was in response to concerns expressed by VCAT.

3. Is Council aware that the method being used by Wannon Water is an anti-community, anti-township method and that it is preventing the investment of a lot of money and employment of a significant number of jobs in remote townships such as Beech Forest?

Response:

The Acting General Manager for Community and Development Services advised that there were a number of different methods that could be used and that Council

understood and shared the concerns of landowners which is why it had pushed hard to get a commitment of funds from other stakeholders in order to develop a Domestic Wastewater Management Plan.

Cr Delahunty returned to the meeting at 4.29pm.

Simon Arundell – Bungador

1. Why aren't the new bins put into storage until needed in order to save money?

Response:

The Mayor advised that the program for the delivery of new organic bins had been implemented.

2. Why can't the Shire admit that it has made a mistake and stop the program?

Response:

The CEO advised that the rollout of the bins was not a mistake and would not be stopped.

3. Does Council have in place a disease program for the Colac saleyards?

Response:

The CEO advised that investigations had been undertaken into Mr Arundell's concerns and the advice received is that the use woodchips does not increase or decrease the risk of disease. The roof at the saleyards would keep the woodchips from getting wet and the Pakenham saleyards had also confirmed that there would be no increase in the risk of disease from the use of woodchips in the saleyards.

4. What would the time delay be, in the event of an outbreak of foot and mouth disease in Australia, in the woodchips being replaced with concrete.

Response:

The CEO advised that the question would need to be taken on notice.

5. Have you forgotten the importance of immunisation in preventing disease control which was the reason the saleyards had a concrete floor. It was part of an immunisation program to ensure that cattle left the saleyards without disease.

Response:

The Mayor advised that all soft floor options had been explored and that it had been identified that woodchips provided the level of comfort demanded by saleyard users for their cattle. Concrete flooring had proven to result in foot soreness for cattle.

6. Why not trial the use of a tar floor in four of the pens? Given that the cattle will produce a large amount of urine resulting in wet woodchips, have the filters and pumps been built to cope with the amount of rubbish that will be coming down the drain?

Response:

The Acting General Manager for Infrastructure and Leisure Services advised that an assessment of soft flooring options had been undertaken in line with the pumping systems at the saleyards.

The CEO advised that investigations had been undertaken into concerns previously expressed by Mr Arundell around the use of substances to protect the galvanized posts at the saleyards. The outcome of these investigations had revealed that the

best protection for galvanized posts was not to apply any substance over the top of them.

Leigh Barrett - Colac

1. What is the impact of replacing the 8,000 organic bins on Council's carbon footprint? What is the net cost benefit of this significant investment of \$800,000? What would the impact be on the proposed rate increase if the bins had not been replaced and the impact be of a zero increase in employment?

Response:

The CEO advised that the questions would need to be taken on notice. However, the current bins are 17 years old and had reached the end of their useful lives and the funds had been set aside in previous budgets to undertake a rolling program of bin replacement.

6. TABLING OF RESPONSES TO QUESTIONS TAKEN ON NOTICE AT PREVIOUS MEETINGS

These responses will not be read out but will be included in the minutes of this meeting.

Alan Billing - Larpent

1. What is the cost to Council of its membership of the Municipal Association of Victoria and the LGA, including the cost of Councillor participation?

Response:

Council's annual subscription to the Municipal Association of Victoria for 2014/15 was \$27.661. There was also a contribution of:

- \$3,300 for the Rural Councils group,
- \$1,129 for membership of the MAV Information Technology Committee,
- \$7,700 to be involved in the MAV Step Asset and Financial Management program
- \$3,080 to be involved in the MAV Step Records/Electronic Content Management program for 2014/15.

The cost of Councillor participation at MAV events and meetings is covered as part of Council's annual subscription with travel the only additional expense borne by Council.

Council is unsure of the "LGA" organisation Mr Billing is referring to.

2. Is the pathway being constructed along the Lake Corangamite Road north of Cororooke to St Brendan's to be a shared pathway suitable for pedestrians, cyclists, prams and wheelchairs? What is the total cost of the pathway? What is the estimated annual use of the pathway? When approving this development, were Councillors provided with future maintenance costs?

Response:

The General Manager for Infrastructure and Services advised that the questions in relation to costs would need to be taken on notice, however the pathway is being created to cater for shared use between pedestrians, cyclists, prams and wheelchairs.

Further officer response following the Council meeting:

The pathway is a pedestrian path of 1.5m width, and was not designed to meet the criteria for a wider shared path, however under State traffic laws it can be used by young cyclists under 12 years old and adults supervising them.

The project cost is \$80,000 part funded through Council's STIP \$25,000, a TAC Community Road Safety grant \$25,000, a TAC Local Government grant \$25,000, and contributions from The Gardiner Foundation \$4,700 and Red Rock Progress Association \$300.

Whilst there are no estimates of annual use for the path, it has been supported through TAC grants based on its potential to improve road safety for pedestrians travelling between Cororooke and Coragulac, and the linkages between residents and facilities such as the General Store, Public Hall, Café, Tennis Courts, and the like.

The future maintenance costs for the path were not provided to Councillors when allocating STIP funds, but are factored into the recommendations of officers when advising Council on future projects.

3. What was the cost of purchasing the twin wheelie bins currently being stored in Council's \$800,000 storage shed in Railway Street? What was the cost of these bins, who made the decision to purchase them and what is planned for these bins in the future?

Response:

By twin wheelie bins Council understands Mr Billings to be referring to the 360 litre recycle bins purchased from Mastec. Through waste audits conducted jointly with neighbouring Councils it was identified that approximately 20% of the material in household garbage bins was recyclable. Not only was this costing Council more money to dispose of to landfill than it would to recycle but it was also the loss of a valuable resource. One of the issues which was identified was that some household recycling bins were filled to capacity and so additional recycling went into the garbage bin. As a result 100 x 360 litre wheelie bins were purchased for a trial usage at a cost of \$85 per bin. Currently we have 8 of these bins with red lids being used as litter bins at Meredith Park and Lavers Hill. Approximately 15 of these bins have been placed in the community where householders have identified that one 240 litre recycling bin does not meet their needs. Due to the moulded body of the bin they can be lifted by the standard grab on the waste truck. It has been identified that when filled with normal household-commingled recycling no problems have been experienced with lifting. The bins are not suitable where a premise has a high usage of heavy recycling such as glass or bulk paper.

The waste management department made the decision to purchase the bins as they had proved successful at other Councils that had trialled them.

The availability of the 360 litre bin for residents wishing to upgrade has been advertised in the waste brochure which is being distributed with the waste calendars this year.

Bill McCarthy

1. With respect to planned works on the grasslands and garden beds at the Lake Colac foreshore, can Council approve the cost of \$70,000 to widen the paths up to national standards, before the proposed garden edging is installed in two weeks' time?

Response:

The Acting General Manager for Sustainable Planning and Development advised that Mr McCarthy's comments with respect to the pathway would be taken on board, however no guarantees can be made at this time regarding changes to the plans.

Follow Up Response:

The Manager Environment and Community Safety contacted you on 2 June to discuss the planned work on the Lake Colac Foreshore and advised that the new garden beds would be placed 60cm back from the edge of the existing pathway and that this would allow for any future widening of the path. While there is currently no intention to widen the path, the development of the new Lake Colac Master Plan would provide the community with an opportunity to discuss whether it is something they would like to see occur in the future.

2. The commencement date of 9 June 2015 to install the garden edging will not allow time for the widening of the path which is required to meet national standards.

Response:

The Acting General Manager for Sustainable Planning and Development advised that the question would need to be taken on notice.

Follow Up Response:

As noted above, whilst there is currently no intention to widen the path, the development of the new Lake Colac Master Plan would provide the community an opportunity to discuss whether it is something they would like to see occur in the future.

3. What was the process for installing the recent linemarking undertaken in Colac given that the bicycle lanes do not meet any road safety standards?

Response:

The General Manager for Infrastructure and Services advised that the linemarking had been designed to meet current road safety standards.

4. What standards have been applied in this instance?

Response:

The bicycle lanes currently installed throughout Colac and Apollo Bay as part of the Bicycle Lane Linemarking Project have been implemented with reference to Australian Standard 1742 – Manual of uniform traffic control devices – Part 9: Bicycle Facilities, VicRoads Cycle Notes 12, and Austroads Guide to Traffic Engineering Practice Series Part 14.

5. Given that the amount spent on cyclists in the Colac Otway Shire of only \$4 per head is one of the lowest in the state, what is the forecast budget to be spent on cyclists?

Response:

There were two major projects completed in the 2014/15 financial year for the express purposes of improving cycle infrastructure throughout the Colac Otway Shire. These were:

- the Bicycle Lane Linemarking Project with total funding of \$70,000, and
- the Bike Rack Project, which sought to install 28 new bike racks at suitable locations throughout Colac, Elliminyt and Apollo Bay. This project has funding of \$20,000.

There are no proposed bicycle-related infrastructure improvement projects as part of the 2015/16 Council Budget.

Any land within the shire which is "Farm Land" within the meaning of Section 2 of the Valuation of Land Act 1960 and is zoned to allow land to be used for rural and/or farming purposes..

4.2.4 Holiday Rental Land

Any land that contains a dwelling, cabin or house or part of a house that:

- is used for the provision of holiday accommodation for the purpose of generating income; or
- o is made generally available for holiday accommodation and is a secondary or supplemental source of income for the owner.

Note: Typically, the category will include absentee owned holiday houses, owner occupied "Bed and Breakfast" establishments, farm properties with accommodation cabins, holiday farms and the like.

The category will not include land used to provide tourist/holiday accommodation on an overtly commercial scale and basis where the provision of accommodation is an integral part of the use of the property. The types of properties excluded from this category would include motels, resorts, hotels with accommodation, caravan parks, centrally managed and promoted multi-unit developments and the like.
