

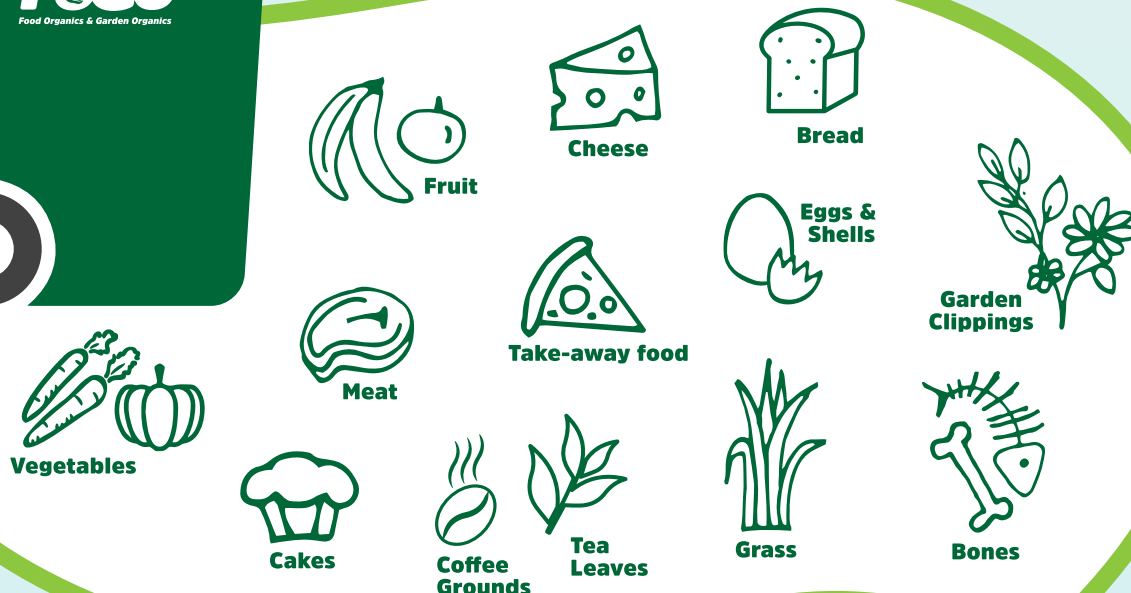

**Place your food waste in loose, wrap it in newspaper or use a certified compostable bag or liner marked with the seedling logo.**



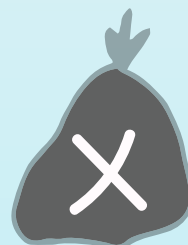
Newspaper Liner
